
- On this Holy Night, we know many struggle to celebrate the coming of Leader: your kingdom amid deep poverty and broken systems.



The Service of Lights

The sanctuary lights are dimmed to symbolize the darkness of the world without Christ. Those worshipping remotely are invited to dim the lights. The burning Advent candles represent the divine source of light coming into the world.

Seventh Lesson

John 1: 1-14 The Light of the World Has Come

Lighting of the Christ Candle

<u>Remote Worshippers</u>: You are invited to light a "Christ candle." If using an advent wreath or four candles (any size) placed in a circle, the Christ candle sits in the center of the wreath/circle.

<u>In-Person Worshippers</u>: The pastors will light the candles of the ushers, who will then light the candle of the first person on the inside of each pew so that the light may be passed down the pew. Please **tilt the unlit candle towards the lit candle**, keeping lit candles upright.

We will sit and hold the lit candles throughout the singing of "Silent Night," stand and lift them up for the Charge & Benediction, and then extinguish their flames following "Joy to the World."
